You will need more through the year as needed.</p> <p>High School Standards: High School courses are specifically designed for students performing that are self-motivated to keep up with the challenge of advanced courses. We want each of our students at The Creek to be placed in appropriate courses, with the level of each course matching both the ability level of the student and their motivation/effort. High School courses have set expectations/standards that are adhered to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> In order to continue to participate in High School courses the student must maintain at least a 3.0/B. If at the end of the 1st 9-week grading period, the student's course grade falls below a B the student will be placed on probation and a meeting will be held with the student and parent to discuss ways to help the student can improve their academic performance. <p>If after the 2nd 9-week grading period, the 1st semester average for that particular High School course has not reached at least a 3.0/B, a schedule change will be made for the 3rd 9-week period to a lower level course. At the end of the school year a B average is required to remain in the course for the subsequent school year.</p>
	<p>FEES</p>	<p>Students will need to bring in a \$10.00 supply fee for a Spanish subscription magazine (12 issue – full year). This will be collected the first week of School.</p>

	<p>COURSE/SCHOOL BEHAVIORAL EXPECTATIONS</p>	<p>All Swift Creek Middle School teachers expect students to adhere to the Leon County Schools Attendance Policy and Student Code of Conduct, which includes the dress code, and expectations of academic integrity such as cheating and plagiarism. In order to be successful in Spanish, it is very important that the student stays focus during class instruction and be responsible in coming to class and completing all the assignments in a timely manner.

The students will be introduced to the Spanish – speaking world by learning a language but also understanding the culture and the benefits of learning a second language. The student is expected to do their best and understand that learning a second language is challenging and that it takes time (years) and a lot of effort to learn it.

During class, I will use various teaching methods such as: partner dialog, choral response, cooperative learning, project based learning, close reading, direct teaching (lecture), video and film, audio listening activities and student self-reflection on learning.

C	70 – 79	<i>Student is successful with most assignments. Gaps may exist in the understanding of difficult topics. Tutorials and/or attention to good study habits may be necessary.</i>
D	60 – 69	<i>Student is having difficulty with course content, assistance is necessary for student improvement.</i>

HOMEWORK	Students will have homework assignments. These assignments will usually be started in class where students can seek extra instruction as needed. Students should complete homework as needed and be prepared with questions on problems that they may need help with.		
MAKE-UP WORK PROCEDURE	Leon County School Board Policy allows students to make up work within a reasonable amount of time after returning to school following an excused absence. The allotted time will be determined by district policy and communicated by the teacher to both parent(s) and the student. Make up work is the student's responsibility. On the day of the student's return, the student should check with Mrs. Sessions to find out what assignments were missed. For every day of an excused absence, you have two (2) days to make-up assignments. All assignments that are not turned in at this time will be recorded as zeros. Missed tests must be scheduled with me for a time to be determined. Tests not made up will recorded as zeros.		
LATE WORK POLICY	Students are expected to turn in every assignment on time. Mrs. Sessions will not accept late work. Any assignment turned in late will be counted as an INC (incomplete) in the gradebook; which is valued at zero credit. The only occasion in which late work will be accepted is with a valid written medical or emergency excuse from a parent/guardian. After receiving this excuse, the make-up Leon County policy will be in effect.		
ASSIGNMENT RE-DO POLICY/PROCEDURE	Students have the opportunity to do one retake on any test they score below 70%. The highest score possible in a retake is 75%. Prior taking the retake, they must correct any missed problems on the original test.
